

An Ancient-Future Church

At the recent gathering of the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church, Presiding Bishop Michael Curry addressed the twin issues of the future of faith and the church as an institution. Bishop Curry shared that when he was in South Africa the week prior, a young Anglican asked him if there was a future for the church. "I realized that he was asking if there is a future for faith," Curry said. "Therefore, does the church, the community of people who have faith in Jesus, have a future?"

Bishop Curry told the young man, "Faith does not have a future if faith and religion is seen and understood primarily as an institutional arrangement. Faith will not have a future if we believe that the church is primarily an institution which we must prop up to keep it going." Bishop Curry went on to say that God is not calling the church to enact

another strategic plan, but to dare "to ask the Spirit, 'Where shall we go?'"

Curry reminded the Executive Council that before the church was an institution, "it began as a nascent Jesus Movement." Today the church has become "a fragile minority" in our society. We need to recapture our passion and drive for Jesus and the Gospel. We must witness the Jesus way of love. "When we are less than that, then we ought to die because we have nothing to give the world," he said.

Bishop Curry then asked the Council "to think, to pray, to listen to what the Spirit is saying to our church and find our life." He concluded, "We may not have easy days ahead of us, but that's all right. Our Lord was crucified; Pilate thought he killed him – thought he was down for the count – but on Sunday morning, the brother got up and that's who we follow. If we follow his way of love, then the gates of hell will not prevail against us."

Bishop Curry addressed an issue of deep concern to all Episcopalians: What is the future of Christian faith in our culture and in our church? What will faith look like in the future? What will the church look like? What kind of church will be able to witness the faith of Jesus in a rapidly changing world?

The United States is now undergoing a culture shift like none before in our history. There are many aspects to this culture shift, including a pervasive secularism, the disillusionment with established religion, the rise of personal spirituality, the dominance of autonomy, choice, consumerism and self-actualization, and the desire to explore the meaning of life without religious authority. We often hear that people today are "spiritual but not religious," but a growing number are now "spiritual but secular" – meaning that organized religion is no longer an option for them.

Frankly, in such a new religious landscape, the Episcopal Church has been very slow to respond, often doing the same old thing but expecting a different outcome. Einstein said that's the definition of insanity.

As I survey the culture, I think there are three key shifts that have made ministry extraordinarily difficult.

First, people's understanding of God is highly pluralized. There is no one way of thinking about God anymore. Back in the 1950s, sociologist Will Herberg wrote a book titled Protestant, Catholic and Jew in which he argued that there was now an American religious consensus – the Judeo-Christian ethic as normative for society. No one would write such a book today. In terms of religious belief and practice, Americans are all over the place, with a growing number of atheists, agnostics and "nones" – people who vaguely identify as Christian but without church membership.

Second, people no longer feel a need to attend church on a regular basis. Church is one of many options in people's lives, and no longer a high priority. Back in the 1950s, there were "blue laws" which restricted what businesses could be open on Sunday. Today any business may be open. Churches compete on Sunday with the National Football League and Major League Baseball. Children and teen sporting events are now regularly held on Sundays. Social club gatherings, community organizations and environmental groups now meet on Sunday. For many families, Sunday is their day to rest or do house chores. Increasingly, our secular culture has managed to squeeze church out of our lives.

Third, people are increasingly eclectic about what they choose to believe. There is no "one size fits all" anymore. Religion has become a matter of personal preference, much like the kind of food we eat. In our culture we have many "cafeteria Christians" – people who pick and choose what to believe much like they would pick and choose foods at a cafeteria. We even have the phenomenon of people choosing more than one religion at the same time – Jewish Buddhists, Episcopal Quakers, Hindu Catholics, and every conceivable mix. Consistency doesn't matter – personal preference trumps all. Thus, the church – any church – is more a way station than a destination. People remain at a church only so long as their needs are being met. Loyalty to a religious institution is a thing of the past.

This means that the church needs to compete in the marketplace in a way we have never had to do before. The Episcopal Church has been slow to grasp this new way of being church. We need to move beyond thinking of ourselves as an established church and transform into an entrepreneurial church – understanding the people we want to reach, building relationships with the unchurched, meeting needs, healing hurts, planning ministries around lifestyles, and communicating the gospel in ways that resonate with people who may have little or no understanding of Christianity. Our methods will need to change even as the gospel message remains changeless.

How do we do this? We do it not by renouncing the past or uncritically embracing the future but by becoming an "ancient-future" church – a church of roots and wings that is steeped in the truth of the gospel but open to the Spirit active in the world. While I certainly do not claim to have all the answers, here is what I think the "ancient-future church" will look like.

- 1. It will be more experiential and less dogmatic, balancing both heart and mind as two valid approaches to faith.
- 2. It will focus less on distinctive denominational beliefs and more on "faith in Jesus" as the heart of Christianity.
- 3. It will be unashamedly supernatural, from spiritual gifts to miracles, proclaiming boldly the mighty acts of God: creation, incarnation, redemption, resurrection, and the Spirit at work in the church and world.
- 4. It will reach out and minister to people at their own level of need and understanding, offering the good news in terms and forms that relate to their situation, that speak to them in their language and cultural style, addressing their existential questions.

- 5. It will offer diverse worship services on Sunday and during the week that reach people at the different stages of life, with different styles of music, using multi-media, and with messages that are biblical, relevant and practical.
- 6. It will be a community that practices the spiritual disciplines through patterns of listening and speaking to God in sustained prayer, personal devotion, scripture study and fellowship.
- 7. It will be a church that moves beyond the three-fold ministry of bishops, priests and deacons into the five-fold ministry in Ephesians of apostles, prophets, pastors, evangelists and teachers, with all members being ministers.
- 8. It will provide a seven-day-a-week program that is secular as well as religious, including educational, community and recreational programs for all ages.
- 9. It will be a center of mission and outreach that works to solve basic community problems through community action and service, offering the love of God in concrete ways to the least, the last and the lost who are living in poverty, unrelieved suffering and other kinds of need.
- 10. It will extend the church's outreach through the Internet and mass media, marketing to target audiences and sharing the good news of Jesus.
- 11. It will be child friendly and sensitive to the needs of youth, young adults and persons with disabilities.
- 12. It will embrace the potential for becoming a diverse and inclusive congregation multiracial, multigenerational and multicultural, all reflecting the all-embracing love of Jesus.
- 13. It will have a practice of radical hospitality and a willingness to open membership to everyone who could profit from belonging.
- 14. It will tackle the tough issues of the day with moral passion and genuine tolerance, being a public forum for gospel values.
- 15. It will inspire members to extravagant generosity in support of need-meeting ministries that further the reign of God, impact the community and transform lives in Jesus.

I believe that the Episcopal Church is in a unique position to be an "ancient-future" church because of our tradition of comprehensiveness – our willingness to expand our circle of love and be a "both/and" and not an "either/or" kind of church. We have never been content to adopt a sectarian mentality that insulates us from the culture. That is to our credit. So, as we move forward in a post-Christian, post-modern world, we should not lose confidence in our ability to build bridges that connect the church and the unchurched. There is a future for faith in a revitalized Episcopal Church. Yes, the old religious world is falling apart, but the Spirit is stirring anew.

The first followers of Jesus were all Jewish, but from a wide variety of different ideologies. It was when the believers after the resurrection appearances started to spread outward from Jerusalem that they were called "Christians" for the first time—Luke tells us this in his 2nd volume we call "Acts." That community of faith was just one step in evolving into what was becoming the church. The beginnings of our Christian community of faith, the church, started with the people of Israel. Israel had their distinctive beginning in becoming a community of faith only after their deliverance from Egypt. It was in the wilderness between the slavery of Egypt and the promised land of Canaan when this community formed it's religious expression. All the forms of religious expression that were revealed to them in this time

The books of the Bible that tell about this nascent time in their formation are what we call the Pentateuch, or Torah—the instruction of God found in the 1st five books of the Bible. The 4th book, called "Numbers," finishes the Sinai revelation to this community and moves them from the depths of the wilderness to the precipice of the Promised Land. Yes, from the time they leave Egypt in Exodus and then park themselves at the foot of Sinai, 2 books later they are still there, getting instruction on how to worship and get along with one another. When the 4th book ends in Numbers they will still not be in the Promised Land, but purposefully poised to enter it—just on the other side of the Jordan River.

formed the seedbed of what we do in our Sunday morning worship at Nativity.

Bible Study Wednesday has been undertaking a systematic study of the Pentateuch since last summer and continues in Lent with the 4th book, "Numbers." It's simply amazing to see how the experiences of our earliest spiritual forebears are parallel to our own. Their time in the wilderness is a metaphor for the time we collectively know as life-on-earth. We Christians, like Israel, know we have been saved from a fearful existence and that God has a wonderful promise ahead of us; but in the meantime, we're here on this terrestrial plain working out how to get along and how to respond to God's word.

Make Lent 2019 your time to reconnect with your spiritual forebears in faith, and yourself, by partaking of bible study that makes a difference—Wednesday nights at 6:30 with yours truly and your Nativity brothers and sisters.







Planned Giving

What Is Planned Giving?

Planned giving encompasses a variety of ways that gifts can be made to the church from accumulated resources.

It usually involves financial or estate planning; however, it is not reserved for the wealthy. Planned giving is a means by which anyone concerned with the wise use of his or her personal resources makes a considered choice about their ultimate disposition.

In general planned gifts are made through:

Bequest in a Will

Planning for the End of Life

Life Income Gift such as a pooled income fund, a charitable gift annuity, or a charitable remainder trust

- Pooled Income Fund
- Charitable Gift Annuity
- Charitable Remainder Trust

Gifts of Special Assets (real estate, closely held stock, life insurance, retirement accounts)

Planned giving establishes a way for a donor to provide for family members while remembering the church as well. It often enables the donor to provide more for his or her heirs and to make a larger gift than thought possible. It often reduces taxes as well.

Planned gifts can be designated for an organization's general funds or its endowment.

Planned gifts are either outright gifts (i.e., gifts of appreciated securities, real property, personal property, etc.) or deferred gifts (i.e. bequests, charitable gift annuities, charitable trusts).

Apply for Your Scholarship Now!

Thanks to parishioner Mary Longley Cook, the Church of the Nativity now has a scholarship fund to assist a parishioner with high education expenses. We are inviting interested parishioners who will be attending post-secondary education in the fall to apply now for a scholarship. Candidates may be either graduating high school students or students already in college or university. People considering or already enrolled in trade schools will also be considered.

Candidates interested in applying for a scholarship will need to complete a scholarship application form which can be picked up in the parish office. They will need to supply their personal information, extracurricula activities and any community service or other relevant information. A reference from a school official will need to be submitted along with a certified copy of grades and evidence of admission to a post-secondary educational institution. Candidate should also submit an essay detailing career goals, personal history, the institution in which the candidate will be enrolled, and the proposed course of study. All this information is on the application form.

The scholarship committee would like to encourage parishioners to donate to the fund. As the fund grows, there will be opportunity to assist more parishioners with their educational expenses. In an era when college and university tuition is becoming an astronomical expense, Nativity will be able to assist worthy parishioners with at least some portion of their costs. This is an investment in the future as well as an investment in our children.

For prospective applicants, please apply as soon as possible. While there is no set deadline, the scholarship would like to award a scholarship for the fall term. Applicants will ideally have all their materials into the committee by April 15. A copy the application is included in this newsletter. For more information about the scholarship and fund, please speak with Gary Nicolosi our Interim Rector, Mandy Hodges our Christian Education Director, or Art Graf our Treasurer.

A vital outreach at Nativity is helping the mothers and babies at Homeward Bound. Please console your hearts and consider helping the smallest among us in need.


For those of us who haven't purchased diapers in a long while, they come in a variety of sizes and the ones most needed are size 4 and 5.


Anti-Aging Therapies Discussion Group
