

Love, Learning and Life-Giving Fellowship

In April I will have two months remaining as your Interim Rector. On June 1st I will leave the church in the trusted care of Dr. Wayne Whitney, Fr. John Miller and Deacon Martha Durham. They will be your clergy team until your new rector is on board sometime during the summer. As I write this, your search committee is busily at work selecting the finalists for your vestry to interview for your next rector. I can assure you, we have excellent candidates in the process, and I have no doubt that Nativity will soon be blessed with a faithful, compassionate and competent priest.

As I draw down on my ministry at Nativity, I have begun to think about the strengths of this church. Just what are the strengths that will carry Nativity

into the future? There are three I want to share with you: love, learning and fellowship.

Love

What has impressed me so thoroughly about parishioners in this church is their deep commitment to walk the way of love as followers of Jesus. Whether we are Republicans or Democrats, liberals or conservatives, what binds us together is our common commitment to share the love of Jesus with each other and also with those beyond our parish.

Nativity stands for the truth of God's amazing grace and unconditional love reflected in how we minister and treat others. We stand for this against the negative and polarizing forces in the world that would limit that love to people who think like us, or look like us, or even act like us. Our God loves everyone everywhere without exception. In the end what matters is not how we think about God but the way we love God – and we love God by loving people.

You at Nativity do this in so many ways, from the welcome ministry that greets newcomers at the door, to the shepherds who care for their flocks, to the hospitality after worship services, to the outreach ministries which seek to reach out to those beyond our parish. This is a church that takes to heart Archbishop William Temple's maxim, "The church exists for the benefit of those who do not belong to its membership." May Nativity continue to be that kind of church!

Learning

Second, this parish stands for what the former Archbishop of Canterbury Robert Runcie called "thoughtful holiness" – the enduring marriage of faith and reason that resists the extremes of radical relativism on the one hand and irrational fundamentalism on the other. Here in this church we are not afraid to ask the hard questions because we know that part of mature Christian believing is to love God with our whole mind as well as our heart. We know that faith may be simple at times, but it is never simplistic. In this parish, we understand our religion as our best efforts to be related to the eternal God revealed in Scripture, tradition, reason and experience. We stand for the lifelong search for this God, convinced that there is as much joy and integrity in living the questions as in finding the answers.

I am delighted there is so much learning taking place at Nativity, and not just for our children and teens, but for adults and young adults. Dr. Wayne's Bible studies are an immense treasure to this church as are the groups on contemplative prayer, Bishop Curry's, The Way of Love, and the retreats, seminars and workshops that are offered throughout the year – not to mention the thoughtful sermons that are preached every Sunday.

Robert Frost said that "education is hanging around till you catch on." In this place, we understand that religion is for many of us hanging around till we catch on, and then hanging on some more because the challenge and possibilities of wholeness are never-ending. We believe that we never finish the search, and that we never completely catch on, because God's truth is always greater than our understanding of it. We, all of us, are on a journey toward growth and wholeness that will take not less than our entire lives, but the journey we know is worth it.

Life-Giving Fellowship

Third - Nativity is a place of life-giving fellowship. This is the fellowship that nurtures, supports and loves us through the search for the truth of God's love: that loves us through the moments of pain, transition and change. Those of us who work in the church know how trivial and self-serving the "institutional" church can be at times. But we also wonder what we would do without the church. How could you celebrate Christmas without the church? How could you wake up in the dark of Easter morning without the church? Where else would one turn when one's spirit is assaulted and one's emotions are raw from loss if not to the church and to the people of the church?

I have often shared with you, and I do so again, the wonderful insight of Bishop Michael Marshall about the church. He said that the church is a gathering of people who have nothing in common except Jesus Christ in whom they have all things in common. Diversity is life-enhancing and life-affirming, not threatening or damning. Differences are not to be feared, only understood. God forbid that we should ever prefer a stale uniformity to the wonder and mystery of the richness of creation.

Never take with you that myopic way of thinking that divides the world into orthodox and heretic, the remnant and the infidel, the elect and the castaways, the pure and the impure. The world is paying a terrible price for that kind of thinking right now. Instead, travel light with the love of God in your heart and the grace of God in your mind. Travel light and freely love, freely give, freely serve, and freely open yourselves to other people, seeking to embrace them, know them, understand them, because every person we meet is a gift from God.

So, stay loyal to this church, for it stands for love, learning and life-giving fellowship. Support this church for it stands for supporting you. It cannot flourish without you, your time, your energy and your money. Hang around and you will be amazed at what joy and meaning you will find if you will take the time, devote the energy, and make the commitments required by any search that has integrity. You'll catch on; and in catching on, your life, and everything about it will be renewed and energized in a way that will take your breath away.

A parishioner once recommended I teach a series on the topic of "God the Unmerciful" and tackle all of those problematic biblical stories of God acting very harshly toward humans even to the point of death. We all know what kinds of things this refers to especially when we crack open the Hebrew Bible and read a few of it's stories that tell of death coming to people from very unusual circumstances. There is one incident in the book of Numbers where a gathered group of those in rebellion against Moses had the ground open up under their feet resulting in their getting swallowed up to the place of the dead before the earth then shut itself up back to normal again.

Incidents like this one are intended to dramatize the gravity of what our lives are about and who we are for God in the world. It's always important to keep in mind that our Hebrew forbears in faith experienced God at a stage of life that can best be described as "young." We all relate to our parents differently over time as we grow up from infants to toddlers to children to youth and eventually to adults, hopefully. As we mature as human beings, our relationship with God matures as well. The flow of our faith relationship with God started where all parent-child relationships start. And our experiences at the youngest ages when retold in that same young voice will cast a view of God in a very stern and strict way—those stories can't sound much different than that.

When Jesus came on the scene in the 1st Century he challenged people to a much more mature relationship with our Creator God. And no matter how much we experience this relationship from Jesus' teachings, especially with what we hear in the Sermon on the Mount, it never stops being challenging if not frustrating. It costs us something to move to the next level of faith. It costs us a great deal to give up old ways of being that would liberate us in the freedom and peace of the Gospel of Christ. We who call ourselves Christian are on the hook for a great deal of what God is trying to accomplish in history.

Unfortunately, we are also on the hook for bringing a lot of misery to the world. Our job as Christ's own is to discern where this history is going and get on God's side of it. This work is the task of the disciple—to always look for how God is being merciful toward

me despite my personal failings and shortcomings instead of merely rejoicing at the misfortune of others because "they had it coming."

Thankfully God does not count our transgressions against us—or we'd all get what we deserve, which isn't the best of what God has to offer us. Joyfully we celebrate being recipients of God's love and forgiveness and that impacts how we treat others as well.

Enjoy your Lenten journey as you experience God in ever more expansive ways.

Sunday, April 28th will be a special Sunday recognizing those dedicated to our music ministry.

In this season, listen for Taizé music featured during communion each Sunday of Lent. As you may know, Taizé was founded in 1940 by Roger Louis Schutz-Marsauche (best known as Brother Roger). This community & city in France is a center for worship, meditation and prayer for Roman Catholics and Protestants from all over the world. Their gatherings are incredibly diverse (their website is available in 40+ languages!!) as well as the music that they have created and accumulated in recent decades. The music, defined by simplicity and prayer, is a collection of tunes in various languages and is freely translated to other languages. In most songs, a short refrain is repeated over and over like chanted prayers. Often there are cantors who lead verses in between refrains while the a cappella choir accompanies underneath. It's not uncommon to find instruments such as cello, flute or guitar accompanying in a simple manner as well.

It's fascinating how many people are attracted to Taizé and it is remarkable to have these precious musical gems that are extremely singable, even in foreign languages. I love the access they provide in the repetition, allowing the congregation to learn the refrain quickly, even if it is unfamiliar. I hope you enjoy the diversity and beauty of this music!



It Is Still Not Too Late to Apply for Your College Scholarship

Applications are still being accepted for the Mary Longley Cook Scholarship, which will assist a parishioner with high education expenses. We are inviting interested parishioners who will be attending post-secondary education in the fall to apply now for a scholarship. Candidates may be either graduating high school students or students already in college or university. People considering or already enrolled in trade schools will also be considered.

Candidates interested in applying for a scholarship will need to complete a scholarship application form which can be picked up in the parish office. They will need to supply their personal information, extracurricula activities and any community service or other relevant information. A reference from a school official will need to be submitted along with a certified copy of grades and evidence of admission to a post-secondary educational institution. Candidate should also submit an essay detailing career goals, personal history, the institution in which the candidate will be enrolled, and the proposed course of study. All this information is on the application form.

The scholarship committee would like to encourage parishioners to donate to the fund. As the fund grows, there will be opportunity to assist more parishioners with their educational expenses. In an era when college and university tuition is becoming an astronomical expense, Nativity will be able to assist worthy parishioners with at least some portion of their costs. This is an investment in the future as well as an investment in our children.

For prospective applicants, please apply as soon as possible. While there is no set deadline, the scholarship would like to award a scholarship for the fall term. Applicants will ideally have all their materials into the committee by **April 30**. A copy the application is included in this newsletter.



The Nativity Legacy Society

Become a member of the Nativity Legacy Society by making a planned gift to Nativity. Planned giving encompasses a variety of ways that gifts can be made to Nativity from accumulated resources. It usually involves financial or estate planning, but it is not reserved for the wealthy. Planned giving is a means by which anyone concerned with the wise use of their personal resources makes a prayerful and considered decision about their ultimate disposition.

In general planned giving gifts are made through:

- •A Bequest in a Will
- •A Life Income Gift such as a pooled income fund, a charitable gift annuity, or a charitable remainder
- •Gifts of special assets (real estate, closely held stock, life insurance)

Planned giving establishes a way for you to provide for family members while also remembering your church. It enables you to provide more for your heirs, to make a larger gift than thought possible, and even reduce taxes.

Planned gifts can be designated for Nativity's general funds or specific ministries. Planned gifts are either outright gifts (i.e. gifts of appreciated securities, real property, personal property, etc.) or deferred gifts (i.e. bequests, charitable gift annuities, charitable trusts). Gifts of life insurance and retirement accounts are another appropriate way to make a planned gift to the church.

In additional to the financial and emotional benefits of planned giving, there is a spiritual benefit. Jesus often talked about our relationship to the things we possess. In Luke 12: 13-21 Jesus is asked about dividing a family inheritance. He replies with a story. A rich man decides to build new barns to hold his bumper crop, then to "eat, drink and be merry."

However, "God said to him, 'Fool! This night your soul is required of you; and the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' So is he who lays up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God."

We are stewards of God's bounty. Caretakers, trustees or stewards of all that we possess while we are on this earth. For a brief period we are given time, energy, and resources. What we do with these gifts ultimately defines the character of our life and the depth of our spiritual understanding.

Planned giving is one expression of the wise use of the personal resources God has entrusted to you. When you become a member of the Nativity Legacy Society by leaving a planned gift to the church, you are continuing to support Nativity even after your passing, helping to expand the kingdom of God, making this world a little more Christ-like, and building a community of compassion that shares God's love in Jesus with everyone.
