

A Place of Grace for All People

I heard a sermon by Dr. James Forbes, who at the time served as Senior Minister at Riverside Church in New York City. Dr. Forbes recounted his childhood in North Carolina when all eight children were summoned to the dinner table by their mother. Everybody would gather around the table, and just as she was ready to serve the meal, she would always say, "Are all the children in?"

That's a wonderful phrase, isn't it? "Are all the children in?" Families, by their very nature, are supposed to be inclusive. If you're part of the family, you have a place at the table. You might be a good family member. You might not be so good a family member. Whatever – if you're part of the family, you have a place

at the table.

One of my main tasks as your Interim Rector has been to bring the people in this parish together in common mission. Frankly, I think we are a very different parish from the one I first experienced when I began my ministry with you in September 2017. Morale is high. Members feel good about the church and about themselves. Financially, we have no debt. Numerically, we are growing and attracting new members. Spiritually, people are thinking through their faith as never before. Pastorally, members are being cared for, visited and ministered to. Missionally, our outreach is at an all-time high, with many volunteers for a plethora of ministries. By any standard of measurement, Nativity is a healthy, wholesome, multigenerational church.

Of course, we have our challenges, as does any church. You may have read about a recent report on religion that church membership is at an all-time low – about 50% of Americans belong to a church or house of worship, even as 77% still claim to believe in God or a higher power. The largest religious demographic group in America are the "nones" – people without any church affiliation. Some nones are atheists, some agnostics, but the majority are simply "secular but not religious" – which means that even if they do believe in God, organized religion is not an option. Nones tend to be educated, liberal or moderate in their politics, solidly middle or upper middle class, concerned about the planet, and placing a high value on freedom and autonomy while also wanting community and connection. How does the Episcopal Church reach these people? No one has yet come up with an effective strategy to reach the nones, though Methodist theologian George Hunter has written a series of influential books on the issue. I am convinced that the key to Episcopal church growth is to reach secular people.

This parish and its new rector will need to work on a church growth strategy to reach secular people – I have my own thoughts on the matter. But what I want to share with you in this: the key to the future well-being of Nativity is to remain a united parish – holding together despite any political or even theological differences.

In my time at Nativity, there have been some parishioners who have left the parish and gone to either big independent churches, or Bible churches, or even the Catholic Church. I respect anyone's faith journey to choose the church that works best for them. But the truth is: there are no perfect churches because there are no perfect people. In the end, it is grace alone by faith alone in Christ alone that saves, not our doctrine or purity or righteousness or good judgments.

Right now, the Episcopal Church is changing rapidly. We are electing more and more female bishops, and I predict within the next ten years (or less) we will have parity between the sexes in the House of Bishops. At the parish level an increasing number of rectors are female – and that number is growing. Likewise, the number of gay and lesbian clergy is growing in the Episcopal Church and right here in the Diocese of Arizona – our own Dean of Trinity Cathedral is gay.

And yet, whatever the changes in the Episcopal Church, our mission remains unchanging. According to Jesus' Great Commission, our mission is to make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of our Triune God and teaching them to obey everything that Jesus commanded (Mt. 28:19-20). Jesus invites us into a radical way of loving that is unconditioned by our opinion of others' beliefs, actions, cultures, or lifestyles. In my view, we are to be as lavish with God's love as Jesus was and is.

In the Episcopal Church there is great diversity of opinion on ethical, economic, social, theological and political issues. I value that our church does not ignore or deny these differences but provides a place where we can safely and openly discuss them.

The church is always at its best when it is a community of love, acceptance and forgiveness – a place of grace for all people. It is only through love that we will know the mind of Christ. The gate to the kingdom of God is narrow, not because it requires a narrow mindset or viewpoint to enter; rather it is narrow because so few are able to trust that God's love is so wide. It is the wideness of God's love that embraces us all and unites us beyond our human divisions.

What holds us together as Episcopalians is not the purity of our beliefs, but the greatness of God's love shown to us in Jesus, and in our willingness to trust the Holy Spirit's guidance as the church seeks to discern where God would lead us.

Thus, we commit ourselves as a diverse people to worship together, to stay together in fellowship, to listen to one another, to support one another, to respect one another, to care for our neighbors, and in love to follow Jesus, who was and is the perfect expression of love in the world. Let us never forget that Jesus is the one who formed the church, not as a place to stand and divide, but as a place to love and unite.

I believe that the Church is the last best hope for the world. Why do I believe that? I believe it because in a world – and in a country – so deeply divided and politically polarized, the church is that one institution committed by Christ to be an agent of God's love and reconciliation.

There is enough division in our world today – Israelis and Palestinians refusing to settle their differences, Hindus and Muslims fighting on the India-Pakistan border, Muslims and Christians engaging in bitter conflicts in African nations, and the list goes on. People in our world seem unable or unwilling to respect differences and live with diversity.

The one place where diversity should not be a threat is the Christian Church. In the church, at least, we should be able to live with our differences. If we cannot do that, then Christians have nothing constructive to say to the rest of the world. Our witness to Christ's love will fall flat. We must show the world that unity amidst diversity is indeed possible in Christ.

In the end, we have more that unites us than divides us. Undergirding our life as Episcopalians is the preaching of the Word of God and the administration of the Sacraments. Week by week we continue to receive the Bread and Wine of Christ's Body and Blood, hear the words of pardon and absolution that our sins are forgiven, and share in our common life together as the people of God.

The Book of Common Prayer assures us that in our reception of the Body and Blood of Christ we are heirs of God's eternal kingdom. And so we are. Change is part of life, but God's love never changes. That love is with us now and forever. At your baby's baptism, at the marriage of your son or daughter, at the death of your loved one, in times of crisis and sickness, in a nursing home or hospital bed, the church is there for you – praying for you, blessing you, pardoning your sins and assuring you of a place in heaven.

So what more could you want in a church? Yes, we Episcopalians are not perfect, only forgiven. We know that the integrity of love is far more important than the purity of doctrine. We would rather be judged for loving too much than loving too little. Say what you like about the Episcopal Church, it is a place of grace for everyone willing to live with grace towards everyone in need of grace.

In this church we all have a place at the table. So, let us reach out to an increasingly secular America with the good news and good works of God's love in Jesus. Let us not just receive the Body of Christ but be the Body of Christ in the world.

And let us never give up on each other because our great God never gives up on us - never!

One Last Word... About the Gift of Tongues Heather Nicolosi

In a few weeks our family will be leaving Nativity, now that Gary's interim assignment is coming to an end. All three of us in the Nicolosi household have enjoyed getting to know you over the last 21 months of Gary's tenure. As some of you may recall, last October Gary conducted a S.H.A.P.E. workshop on spiritual gifts. As part of the program, he asked me to say a few words on a gift that I have, the gift of tongues. Some at the workshop wanted more information on the topic, which I am now happy to share with you.

One of the most well-known Bible stories that refers to the gift of tongues is the Pentecost narrative found in Acts 2. Jesus was gone. The disciples were in an upper room waiting for the promised Holy Spirit when suddenly there came upon them a mighty wind and what seemed like tongues of fire rested on each of them. The Bible says, "All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in tongues as the Spirit enabled them." This unusual experience allowed them to communicate the wonders of God with people from all over the known ancient world in their own languages. From that moment on, tongues related to an outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

The Apostle Paul also spoke in tongues. He favored his own language when instructing others, but he was still thankful for the gift (I Cor. 14:18). But why you might ask? He viewed tongues as direct communication with God, and he felt that when a believer was speaking in tongues it was the person's spirit that was praying directly to the Father. "For those who speak in a tongue do not speak to other people but to God" (I Cor. 14:2). He taught that when one was praying in tongues, they were speaking spiritual mysteries or revelations (I Cor. 14:2). Utilizing the gift was helpful in strengthening or edifying their inner spirit, much like the use of a devotional. Tongues might also have been a form of worship (I Cor. 14-15) and used for intercession when one felt burdened about a person and/or situation but didn't know what to say (Rom. 8:26).

Scripture uses phrases like "new tongues" (Mark 16:17), "tongues like fire" (Acts 2:3), "speak with tongues" (Acts 10:46), "different kinds of tongues" (I Cor. 12:10) and "tongues of mortals and of angels" (I Cor. 13:1). According to author Perry Stone, "The word tongues in Greek is glossa, and it can mean "languages" which in context with speaking in tongues are languages not known by the speaker but imparted by the Holy Spirit."

So, languages can be from other nations, other dialects or even heavenly in nature; but unknown to the speaker. I know of one Christian leader who wanted confirmation about what he was speaking. He was delighted when a young woman came up to him after a worship service and said she knew he was speaking Portuguese and that he said, "Hooray, long live Jesus!" Several years ago, an American missionary to Russia recognized immediately the language of a young Russian's new gift of tongues because he spoke English. And when a friend in Canada of Western European heritage speaks in tongues, her tongue has a distinct Asian tone to it, though she knows no Asian languages at all.

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I myself received the gift of tongues through the laying on hands at an Intervarsity Christian Fellowship meeting one Friday night at college. A guest speaker spoke on the topic. The speaker then laid hands on me to receive the gift of tongues. In a short while, I was speaking in an unknown language. I want to be clear: this was not my religious background. I had strong Anglican/Presbyterian leanings. But it happened to me just the same. Unfortunately, I told the wrong person about my experience who shamed me into silence. It was only about 12 years ago that a dear friend urged me to start using this gift once again.

At the time I began to question the state of my faith. I sought out some help and connected with an Apostolic/Messianic group of Christians who were open to all the gifts of the Holy Spirit, including tongues and the interpretation of tongues. I have stayed connected ever since and have used this gift primarily in my prayer times. However, I have also witnessed its successful use by others in numerous corporate settings as well.

I know that speaking in tongues has strengthened my relationship with God. My faith has grown, and I am much stronger spiritually than in years past. There was a time when God seemed far-away – not anymore! In fact, sometimes I can feel the presence of the Holy Spirit. I know that the Spirit is near me and in me. The Spirit will receive my prayers and concerns, no matter if I use tongues or not. In addition, my perspective of God has changed, and I now have a greater understanding about his supernatural nature and a keen desire to learn more about those other gifts of the Spirit listed in I Cor. 12: 7-11. I am on a journey with so much more to learn.

And...as it turns out I am not alone. Justin Welby, the 105th Archbishop of Canterbury has the gift of tongues and prays in tongues every day. He said: "In my own prayer life, and as part of my daily discipline, I pray in tongues every day – not as an occasional thing, but part of daily prayer." The Archbishop also said he expected to "hear from God through other people with words of knowledge or prophecies – some of which I am unsure about, others I can sense there being something of the Spirit of God."

The Archbishop also said that he received the gift two weeks after he became a Christian at the age of 19. "It was from that moment and in the days that followed that I realized that the Holy Spirit of God had touched me in a very powerful way. I began to speak in tongues and began to learn of the intimacy that Christ brings us."

FEED THE HUNGRY

Next month we start a new outreach ministry at Nativity. We will have the opportunity to help the hungry right here in the Valley of The Sun and not just by digging deeper into our pockets. We will prepare food and serve it directly to the men of The East Valley Men's Shelter in Mesa. The Shelter houses 94 men who are trying to work their way back into society. These are men who have been on the streets, or jail or just temporarily down on the luck. They all share the common goal of wanting to put their lives back together. The men work in the area, are not allowed to drink or smoke, and of course are clean of drugs.

The Shelter helps the men find work and provides a place to sleep and eat. Meals are all provided by churches across the valley. We will take them dinners once a month; the dates shown below. Volunteers (8 to 10) will pick up the food ahead of time, usually from Costco, and meet at the church around 4:30 to carpool to the Shelter. Then we heat and prepare the meals in their large kitchen and serve the meals to the men.

The Shelter is located at 2345 N Country Club Drive in Mesa. It is on the Northeast corner of Highway 202 and Country Club (Highway 87 at that point), about 30 minutes south of the church.

Gifts of Special Assets (real estate, closely

held stock, life insurance, retirement accounts)

Planned giving establishes a way for a donor to provide for family members while remembering the church as well.

It often enables the donor to provide more for his or her heirs and to make a larger gift than thought possible. It often reduces taxes as well.

Planned gifts can be designated for an organization's general funds or its endowment.

Planned gifts are either outright gifts (i.e., gifts of appreciated securities, real property, personal property, etc.) or deferred gifts (i.e. bequests, charitable gift annuities, charitable trusts).


