



Wayne's World October 2020

Moses' relationship with God is one of the most truly personal relationships with God in the entire Bible. Our Sunday 1st Lessons shed a lot of light on how Moses and God related to one another. This week's lesson of the giving of the commandments, next week it's the golden calf incident, the week after is a crisis of credulity borne out of frustration, then the final lesson of the month Moses dies, not getting to enter the Promised Land.

There are times when Moses is in God's presence and it's just glorious. Other times Moses is just plain mad at God for the lousy job he's been given of leading such a gnarly group of people out to die in the wilderness. The communication Moses directs at God is honest, angry and always leaving the door open for God to respond in a way that will solve the problem.

Personally, I was angry with God when my first marriage ended back in the late 90's thinking that my personal righteousness had been paid with a check that I couldn't cash. I had to get very honest with God and let it all out. Without this action I would have continued to be bitter and unopened to any divine love.

I believe that when we approach God forthrightly, not mincing words, especially in our personal prayer—we draw close to divine love more than we can imagine. It's okay to be mad at God and with God. Hiding it is the problem. It's the kind of problem that festers and infects that important relationship.

This month's readings tell us about how Moses dealt with his frustration with his situation in the wilderness; and they inform us in our dealings with God. It's an important step on our road to transformation into His likeness. I invite you to crack open that Bible, read it, and identify with those who are most open with God. Sunday morning Power Bible Study offers you an opportunity to reflect on this journey that, for us, is most personal and transformational.

FORWARD IN FAITH

Unless you've gotten a head start on Lent and have given up reading anything Nativity-related for your Lenten "give up," you already know that our 2021 Stewardship Campaign kicks off this coming Sunday. Our theme for this campaign, as Fr. Scot highlighted in his letter to the parish, is "Forward in Faith."

I've had occasion to think about this theme a good deal lately, since I have the honor of serving as the Campaign Co-Chair with my esteemed friend – and one of Nativity's founders – Mark Dobbins. What has especially focused my attention is the word "Forward." I really like it because, to me, it demonstrates "positive movement" – a term that is an accurate description of the twelve-year history of Nativity. As is true for so many of you, Mary Lynn and my Nativity experience began when we met in an office building and had Sunday School in peoples' offices. Think about where we are now – in terms of both real estate and our lives in this wonderful Parish. Think, also, about how we – The Episcopal Church of the Nativity – got here. And what that has to do with the 2021 Stewardship Campaign.

For me, the words in our upcoming campaign say it all. It took a lot of Faith for the good folks who came together to organize the Church of the Nativity to take those giant steps to move us Forward to where we are today. Think about where we are, as a Parish, toward the eve of the year 2021. We have a fine building in which to worship, learn, and celebrate. And I truly believe that there hasn't been a day since the Church of the Nativity came into being that we haven't moved Forward: in our worship, in our service, and in our belief in and commitment to Nativity's mission of "Transforming lives with the love of Jesus Christ." Every day there are members of our congregation – not to mention our clergy and staff – who are doing something tangible to move that mission forward. And underlying every element of our forward movement is Faith.

There is, however, an element of reality that must center us in our faith and in our forward movement: it takes resources. Translating our faith into action and forward movement doesn't happen through magical thinking. It happens when every member of this wonderful Nativity family makes a conscious decision to offer their resources – whether great or small – to allow us to fulfill our mission. Your making a financial commitment to Nativity is the one necessary element of faith that gives tangible meaning to your individual commitments as we go forward in faith. That commitment doesn't require a fixed amount of money; it requires a fixed amount of Faith. Your personal giving is a transformative blessing that says — in the words of the old childrens' hymn — "Oh how I love Jesus, because He first loved me."

EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLAN

We have recently completed a detailed plan for dealing with emergencies if and when one should occur at Church of the Nativity. The plan has been developed by a team consisting of Ron Kupinski, Ramona Rusniak, Kay Blinn, Dina Horseman, James Newhouse, and Jon Bost. The plan is lengthy and we will include highlights from it in future monthly newsletters.

A full copy of it is located inside the cabinet containing the emergency defibrillator unit which is mounted on the wall just North of the main doors in Christopher Hall. Beneath the defibrillator unit we have hung a new first aid kit to be used in case of emergencies. The smaller first aid kit, with band-aids, etc., is still in the office and should be used for non-emergency use. Both the defibrillator unit and emergency first aid kit are secured with twist-off locks so we will know if it has been used and requires attention.

Also inside the cabinet is an emergency event form to be filled out as necessary and given to a member of the response team, a vestry member, or the clergy. Once we are gathering again on a normal schedule inside the church, we are also going to start a series of CPR courses which will be available to all.

As you reenter the church you may notice new emergency exit maps mounted around the facility. These are to aid in case of an emergency evacuation. Please check these out and make a habit of always knowing where your nearest emergency exit is located. Watch for future announcements on dealing with emergencies.
