


A History of Christmas Carols

Beloved Christmas carols bring special joy to our hearts at this time of year. Radio stations begin broadcasting Christmas songs nonstop even before Thanksgiving. In the fourth century CE, church officials proclaimed the birth of Christ as a holiday. The first known hymns celebrating His birth date back to this time period but were primarily in Latin. During the 16th century, English carols particularly flourished with wandering minstrels singing them during the Christmas season. During the Victorian era of the 19th Century, Christmas started to look a lot more like how we celebrate it today. The publication of Christmas books during that period helped widen the popularity of carols. The first printed appearance of some well-known carols such as "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen," "The First Noel," and "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" was in William Sandy's 1833 collection, Christmas Carols, Ancient and Modern. The Oxford Book of Carols, first published in 1928, edited by Ralph Vaughan Williams and Martin Shaw, became a major source of many of the carols still sung today. Let's explore the history of several favorite Christmas carols

"Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" is one of the most popular carols today, but if you had heard it in its original form, it might not have been as recognizable. The original first line of the hymn by Charles Wesley read, "Hark! How all the welkin rings, Glory to the King of Kings." Welkin is an old English word defined as the "vault of heaven." In 1753, George Whitefield, an English preacher, rewrote it to our modern version. Wesley thought his text should be sung to a slow and somber religious tune. The current tune for this carol was composed by Mendelssohn, a Messianic Jew, who wrote it for a chorus of a cantata in 1840. It was then paired with Wesley's text in 1856.

"Joy to the World" actually was written to celebrate Christ's second coming more than the first and is based on Psalm 98. The tune is by George Frederic Handel and is drawn from the opening bars of the chor



"Silent Night"—or Stille Nacht in the original German—was created because Josef Mohr needed a carol for worship. On Christmas Eve of 1818, Mohr visited Gruber with a poem he had written a few years earlier. Gruber quickly arranged the song to be played on a guitar with a choir because the church organ was broken. That evening at Midnight Mass, Gruber strapped on his guitar and led the congregation at St. Nicholas in the first rendition of Silent Night. The original arrangement was a bit faster than the slow, reflective version of the song we know today. But the song was an immediate hit, later being sung by traveling tours and performed before King Frederick William IV of Prussia. Later in the 1800s, the hymn was translated into English and made its way to America by way of a book called Sunday School Hymnal, though with only three of the original six verses.

Today, "Silent Night" is perhaps the most famous Christmas carol in history. It has been translated into most languages, and the Bing Crosby version is the third-best selling single in history. A rebuilt Silent Night Chapel in Oberndorf is now a cultural landmark (a replica can be found in Frankenmuth, Michigan). The song itself was even declared to be an intangible cultural heritage by UNESCO in 2011.



We are excited to offer fun activities for the whole family throughout Advent. Each of these will take place after the 10 am service and all are invited to participate. Supplies will be provided:


- Advent 2, December 5: Ginger Bread House Making


CASA Academy

Council for Native American Ministry

On November 13, 2021, Nativity had the pleasure of hosting the quarterly meeting of The Episcopal Diocese of Arizona, Council for Native American Ministry. The Council, led by the Rev. Canon Debbie Royals, includes Native Americans living in AZ and representatives from congregations and ministries within our Diocese. The goal of the Council is to allow participating congregations the opportunity to share their ministry. These meetings also provide inspiration and ideas for new and creative ways to not only give to those in need but to share our cultures and develop caring relationships.



The Mission and Vision of the Council are to:

- •REMEMBER Native American history is not well-known but has had and continues to have an impact on the original inhabitants of the land. Learning the history of our diocese provides a foundation for living out the Gospel imperative and our Baptismal Covenant to respect the dignity of every human being.
- •RECOGNIZE There are 22 Federally recognized tribes in the Diocese of Arizona.
- •**RECONCILE** the history of the people of the land, our own history and the history of the Episcopal Church.

•RELATIONSHIP developed with people, knowing people, recognizing their gifts and struggles and allowing ourselves to form mutual

communities led by the Spirit of God.

During the meeting, 18 participants including the Rev. Scot McComas, Jennie Dobbins, Cindy Cohen, and Paul Rank, were seated in a Talking Circle, which in the Native American tradition symbolizes equality, ensuring that all people are allowed to speak and the words spoken are accepted and respected on an equal basis. After brief introductions, we discussed the variety of ways our parishes are supporting Native Americans, especially those in need of food, clothing and housing. Due to the COVID pandemic, 2020–2021 has been a time of exceptional need, and parishes sent hundreds of



masks, gallons of hand sanitizer, truckloads of food, and other vital supplies to tribal members.

PJ Jasso, the Director of Public Engagement of Native American Connections, presented a summary of the agency's many services including programs for men and women in recovery from substance abuse disorders; providing affordable housing for 500 families, elders and transition-aged youth; supportive housing for 300 men and women transitioning from homelessness; shelter and support for 140 homeless youth each year as they pursue a healthy future; and development of important community projects like the Phoenix Indian School Visitors Center.

Amber Tso and Kayla White of Native Health, presented the wide range of services that support the agency's mission, "To provide accessible holistic patient centered care, to empower our community to achieve the highest quality health and well-being." Native Health has four locations in Maricopa County providing medical and dental care, behavioral health services, community health & wellness programs, and food programs.


The presentations were well received and stimulated discussion of new opportunities for our parishes to support and participate in the care of our Native American brothers and sisters in need.

The Rev. Canon Debbie Royals gave a summary of recent events affecting the Native American community. She was pleased to share that Bishop Reddall is very supportive of this ministry, as demonstrated by the inclusion of Native American musicians in the Gospel Procession during the


Eucharist at the 2021 Diocesan Convention.

The new flower donation chart for 2022 will soon be available next to the office door and you will be able to get first choice for your special dates. As a reminder, sign up for a week and then...


- * Complete an envelope with your dedication which will be included in the Sunday bulletin. (Needed by Tuesday at noon)
